Background Information for Teachers

Religion has played an important role in the world and over time has changed geographically and along with peoples understanding and perception. However, we still draw many messages from it today. The children will be focussing on Christianity and explore the creation story. The children will re-tell the Christian Creation story and share there interpretation of how the world was created. They will start to talk about how they think the world got here and compare this to the beliefs of Christians.



Religious Focus: Judaism: Passover

Year 2

Background Information for Teachers

Religion has played an important role in the world. The type of religion has changed from place to place and over different times; however, we still draw many messages from it today. The children will be focussing on Judaism. Here they will explore the Passover story. The children will talk about the Seder meal, describing things Jews choose to do to show respect for God. They will make suggestions about what is the least and most important things Jews do that God asks them to do and add at least one reason.

What? (Knowledge)

Exodus Story

The Israelites were God's chosen people. They were enslaved by the Egyptian Pharaoh and forced to work. Moses was chosen by God to lead them to freedom. It was a long and difficult struggle. Moses led the Israelites to the Red Sea where a miracle happened; Moses asked God for help and the sea parted. The Israelites were saved and they could walk through the sea. Moses and the Israelites spent many years travelling, with God watching over them and providing for them. God gave Moses the laws to live by, these became the Ten Commandments.

Passover

Passover is one of the most important festivals in the Jewish year. It is celebrated each spring to remember the freedom o the Israelites. The story can be found in the Torah, the Jewish holy book.

How is Passover celebrated?

On the evening before Passover begins, there is a special service called a Seder. At the meal, there is a special Seder plate.

Christianity: Good Friday

Background Information for Teachers

Religion has played an important role in the world. The type of religion has changed from place to place and over different times; however, we still draw many messages from it today. The children will be focussing on Christianity. Here they will explore the Easter story and Good Friday. The children will explain why Christians believe Jesus's death to be important. They will reflect on whether they agree or disagree with Christian beliefs about Jesus.

What do I already know

The children have previously learnt about Palm Sunday in Christianity from Year I in the Spring Term. They focused on why Palm Sunday was important to Christians.

What? (Knowledge)

What is Good Friday?

Good Friday is a sad story. It is the day in the Holy week on which Jesus died. It is two days before Easter Sunday. In many churches, Christians retell the story of Jesus's crucifixion through the 'Stations of the Cross'.

Events of Good Friday

On Maundy Thursday, (ceremony on the Thursday before Easter) Jesus shared the Last Supper with his friends. He knew he would be betrayed by one of them and be arrested. He shared bread and wine with his friends, telling them, "This is my body. This is my blood. Share this in memory of me." Jesus was later betrayed and was condemned to be crucified by Pontius Pilate. Jesus was mocked and made to wear a crown of thorns. He had to carry his cross to a hill outside of the city. Jesus was nailed to the cross by the Roman soldiers alongside with two thieves. The bible says that the sky grew dark and the temple torn in two at the moment Jesus died. His body was taken down from the cross and placed in a stone tomb.

How was Jesus's death part of God's plan?

Christians believe Jesus's death was part of God's plan to show people that they can be forgiven and start a fresh. Just before his death, Jesus said "Father forgive them." Christians believe that God made a beautiful world, but people started forgetting how to be good to each other and now look at the planet. He sent Jesus to make things better, this meant forgiving them for what they had done wrong.

What is good about Good Friday?

Christians believe that Jesus willingly died to save them and came back to life to prove to them they will have life in Heaven when they die. From something sad came something amazing, Hope.

Judaism: Relationship with God

Year 4

Religion has played an important role in the world. The type of religion has changed from place to place and over different times; however, we still draw many messages from it today. The children will be focussing on Judaism. Here they will explore their relationship with God. The children will make links between Abraham and Moses and the Jewish beliefs. They will be able to articulate ways Jewish

What? (Knowledge)

Abraham and Moses

Jews believe that there is only one God. They believe they have a special agreement with God called a covenant. Jews promise to obey God's laws to say thank you to him for looking after them.

Abraham — Jews believe a man called Abraham was the first person to make a covenant with God. Abraham is considered the father of the Jewish people and the Israelites are his descendants.

Moses — Later, a man named Moses saved the Jewish people from persecution in Egypt when he led them to safety across the Red Sea. After this, the Jews lived in the desert where God gave Moses a set of rules which they should live by, including the Ten Commandments. Moses is the most important Jewish prophet.

The Ten Commandments

The Ark of the Covenant is first described in the book of Exodus, which is the second book of the Torah. The Ten Commandments were a covenant or agreement between God and the Jews. If they followed the rules and laws He laid down, then God would be good to them. To remind the Israelites that He was always with them, God instructed Moses to build a tabernacle, which was a large tent. Inside this, was placed a wooden chest called the Ark. It was here that God told Moses to store the Ten Commandments so that wherever they travelled, the law would be with them. The tabernacle was a holy place but the Ark was the most sacred of all.

Christianity: Cruci fixion

Background Information for Teachers

Religion has played an important role in the world. The type of religion has changed from place to place and over different times; however, we still draw many messages from it today. The children will be focusing on Christianity. Here they will explore the Crucifixion. The children will consider whether God intended Jesus to be crucified or whether Jesus's crucifixion was the consequence of events during Holy Week, finding supporting evidence. They will share their opinion about the importance for Christians of Jesus's death being part of God's plan.

What? (Knowledge)

Christians' meaning of Jesus's life

Christians believe that Jesus was the incarnation of God sent to the Earth to show people how to lead good lives, to die as a sacrifice to save the Earth (so they could be forgiven) and come back to life again to prove to Christians that they could also have life after death.

Events of Holy Week to explore

- Palm Sunday,
- The Last Supper, bread and wine,
- Judas' betrayal,
- Peter's denial,
- Praying on the Mount of Olives,
- Arrest,
- Four trials (Jewish council, Pilate, Herod, Pilate again),
- Cruci fixion,
- Burial in tomb.

Evidence in Scripture

Using Luke's Gospel Chs. 20-23.

Do they think the evidence suggests this was either part of God's plan or a consequence of events that happened during the week:

Did Judas betray Jesus as part of God's plan or because he was jealous and wanted the bribe?

Did Jesus spend time in the temple teaching because it was part of God's plan or because the people asked him to?

Did Jesus get angry in the temple because he was a graid of what was about to happen or angry with the traders for conning people?



Did Jesus know he was destined to die?

Christians believe God intended Jesus to be crucified and everything that happened was all part of his destiny. Jesus knew He was going to be crucified because at the Last Supper he said that the bread represented His body and the wine represented his blood, and they should remember him because he would not always be with them. He also knew that Peter would deny knowing Him three times and that Judas would betray him. Christians believe this was God's plan because somebody needed to take the punishment for everybody's sins or bad deeds.





Christianity: Significance of Mary

Background Information for Teachers

Religion has played an important role in the world. The type of religion has changed from place to place and over different times; however, we still draw many messages from it today. The children will be focussing on Christianity. Here they will explore the significance of Mary, Jesus's mother. The children will make links between the Virgin Birth and Christian beliefs about Jesus (incarnation). They will explain why its is significant to Christians that Mary was Jesus's mother. The children will consider their response to the belief in the Virgin Birth, showing respect for Christian views.

What? (Knowledge)

Who was Mary?

Mary was young and pure. She was a virgin and an ordinary girl (not a princess or celebrity). She was engaged to an honest man named Joseph, who was a carpenter. Mary conceived Jesus through the Holy Spirit while still a virgin. The angel Gabriel appeared to Mary and announced her divine selection to be the mother of Jesus.

Why was a virgin Chosen?

A virgin, like Mary, was chosen so that it was obvious that Jesus was not just a human with two human parents but was also God. The Incarnation (Jesus is God on earth in human form) is a key belief in Christianity.

How significant is Mary

It is significant to Christians that Mary was Jesus' mother because she was a virgin therefore could not have conceived in the natural way. By giving birth to Jesus it was clear that he was the Son of God, God in human form. This is called incarnation. Another reason Mary was chosen is because she was a strong believer in God and very loyal to God. She was also poor so it shows Jesus was on earth for everybody, not just rich people.
